



YIC4 – Yukon Indigenous Community Climate Change Champion Training



Yukon Indigenous Community Climate Change Champions (YIC4) Project Overview

- Two-year training project (2017-2019)
- 29 Yukon First Nations youth
 - Including some guest youth from other northern regions
- Evolved from expressed needs by communities to train community champions
- Mobilize new and existing knowledge on climate change
 - Curriculum developed
 - Integrates Indigenous and scientific ways of knowing and teachings



- Develop young leaders and the next generation of community-based researchers for climate change adaptation
- Allow for communities to define their needs and make priorities for relevant action
- To connect youth to the climate change science and wisdom of their Elders, learn from each other and other communities about possible adaptive strategies

YIC4 Project Overview

- Community research agreements
 - Follow the community's protocol
- Lessons and results can be shared,
 - Overarching adaptation themes can be drawn up to the territorial level
- The curriculum for the training as well as the Community Assessment Tool will be shared
 - The process is a key product
- Climate Change Inventory Map
 - mitigation, adaptation & monitoring initiatives
- A Network
 - Regular webinars, Facebook and email for updates, further training & leadership opportunities

- Community Assessments –youth hired and trained by AICBR




